

In Memoriam Social Workers at the Library

2025 marks the first full year of having two social workers serving B.F. Jones Memorial Library and the Aliquippa Library District.

Libraries are so much more than just depositories for books. Over the past two decades, they have increasingly become true centers of community, providing resources and services far beyond the circulation of reading material. In 2023, BFJ's offerings expanded to include the services of an in-house social worker, Jennifer Honess, LCSW.

The services that Michael and Jennifer are available to provide can be classified by five major subjects:

- Crisis Intervention: providing immediate support during a crisis to help individuals regain equilibrium.
- Case Management: coordinating services and resources to assist individuals or fami-
- Life Skills Training: helping individuals develop essential skills, such as budgeting, job

searching, and time management.

- Advocacy: representing and advocating for library users' rights and needs at individual, group, and community levels.
- Psychoeducation: educating individuals and families about mental health conditions and strategies for managing them.

The Rev. Conrad Person Collection

This special collection, curated in honor of Rev. Conrad Person, aims to inspire readers to participate in the development and enrichment of their communities.

In 2013, the Rev. Conrad Person, who hailed from Heard County, Georgia and moved to Aliquippa as a teenager with his parents and sisters, bequeathed funds to the B.F. Jones Memorial Library that would allow for the curation of a collection devoted to community development and enrichment. The intent was to purchase books that




BFJ's 96th Birthday! The Library opened to the public for the first time on February 1, 1929. Here's to 96 more!
